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Hot NEW Frantzén grill house to open in Stockholm

Coming to Stockholm's trendy Stureplan area in 2026, Emberlin marks a new chapter for Frantzén Group. This contemporary grill house will centre on open-fire cooking, offering an à la carte menu that spans meats, fish, seafood, vegetables and poultry. A raw bar featuring crudos, sashimi and sushi set the tone, while playful desserts add a lighter finish.

Weinberg brings experience from world-class kitchens such as NOMA, Bagatelle and Operakällaren, as well as acclaimed ventures Bokbacka in Oslo and Weinbergs Hotell in Trelleborg.

Karlatornet, Scandinavia’s tallest tower open to the public, in Gothenburg

At 246 metres tall, [Karlatornet](#) becomes the tallest skyscraper in Scandinavia. From the summer of 2026, its panoramic observation deck, [Gothenburg View](#), and its restaurant located on the 69th floor will open to the public.

65 years of the world’s best vanilla ice cream in Halland, Sweden

The world’s best vanilla ice cream officially comes from Sweden. The prize at 2025’s International Ice Cream Conference was awarded to SIA Glass (Glass is ice cream in Swedish) for the second year in a row. SIA’s 65th anniversary in 2026 offers an opportunity to reflect on how an old slaughterhouse became the producer of one of Sweden’s most popular ice creams, called The Ice cream boat.

SIA’s home base lies in the southern region of Halland, on the west coast, a region famed for its long sandy coastline. It is perhaps these long, white-sandy beaches that were the inspiration behind this award-winning ice cream. Visit SIA’s flagship ice cream bars in the seaside town of [Falkenberg](#) and the historic village [of Slöinge](#), where SIA has been producing ice cream in since 1961, and it is here that you will find the entire range of flavours!

TOP TIP: While in Sölinge, make sure to enjoy a Swedish fika at the award-winning [Solhaga Stenugnsbageri](#) (Stone Oven Bakery). This is one of the region’s best-kept secrets, frequented by locals year-round!

Facit’s menu uses only Swedish ingredients and domestic spirits, redefining classic cocktails with a Nordic twist. Together with a handpicked team and top Swedish designers, Åreng promises an innovative experience unlike anything else.

Stockholm’s concert hall celebrates 100 years

100 years ago, in 1926, Stockholm’s concert hall became the country’s first building dedicated to classical music. It is an outstanding example of Swedish classicist architecture, resembling an antique temple. The concert hall celebrates its anniversary – and indeed 125 years of the Royal Stockholm Philharmonic Orchestra - with Ludvig van Beethoven’s Symphony No. 7, music that Beethoven composed while improving his health in a spa. The concert on 9 April similarly offers an opportunity to increase well-being and enhance positive emotions.
